# **Creature Feature**

#### Toadfishes, Batrachoididae

Toadfishes are bottom-dwelling creatures that vaguely resemble scorpionfishes.
They often hide in soft bottom sediment or in rock crevices, tropical species are generally nocturnal and can more often than not found around jetties and wreckage.

Toadfishes have a relatively large mouth and are wellcamouflaged nocturnal predators of small fishes and invertebrates.

Several species in the Australian and East Indian regions are known to incubate eggs and small young in the mouth and the brood (containing at least 50 young) is guarded closely by one of the parents for an undetermined period.


